U.S. Postal Inspection Service - More than 200 Years of Law Enforcement

Bernadette Lundbohm, U.S. Postal Inspection Service

As one of our country's oldest federal law enforcement agencies, founded by Benjamin Franklin, the United States Postal Inspection Service has a long, proud, and successful history of fighting criminals who attack our nation's postal system and misuse it to defraud, endanger, or otherwise threaten the American public. As the primary law enforcement arm of the United States Postal Service, the Postal Inspection Service provides assurance to American businesses for the safe exchange of funds and securities through the U.S. Mail; to postal customers of the "sanctity of the seal" in transmitting correspondence and messages; and to postal employees of a safe work environment.

Postal Inspectors are federal law enforcement officers who carry firearms, make arrests and serve federal search warrants and subpoenas. Inspectors work closely with U.S. Attorneys, other law enforcement agencies, and local prosecutors to investigate postal cases and prepare them for court. There are approximately 1,970 Postal Inspectors stationed throughout the United States who enforce more than 200 federal laws covering investigations of crimes that adversely affect or fraudulently use the U.S. Mail and postal system. Areas of jurisdiction include:

Bombs

Although a rare crime, the mailing of bombs is given one of our highest investigative priorities due to the severe impact it can have on postal customers, employees and operations.

Burglary

The Postal Service experiences about 300 burglaries each year. Inspectors have minimized losses through the use of security equipment and facility design.

Child Exploitation

The Postal Inspection Service has long been recognized as the leading federal law enforcement agency in the effort to combat the production and distribution of child pornography and other crimes exploiting children through the mail and, when it involves the mail, over the Internet.

Controlled Substances

Postal Inspectors initiate investigations related to transporting and distributing narcotics through the mail or at postal facilities.

Electronic Crimes

Inspectors protect postal customers from fraud schemes and other crimes that may occur online and involve the misuse of the mail or of the Postal Service. This includes using or selling stolen or counterfeit access devices, such as credit card numbers; using protected computers without proper authority or exceeding authorized access; using computer communications in a scheme to defraud; using a false identity when sending commercial e-mails to mislead or deceive recipients, as with spam; and unauthorized access to communications that are stored electronically via a communications service.

Identity Fraud

The Postal Inspection Service is a leading federal law enforcement agency in the investigation of identity takeovers.

Mail Fraud

The Postal Inspection Service is committed to protecting postal customers from misuse of the mail. Inspectors place special emphasis on mail fraud scams related to advance fees, boiler rooms, health care,

insurance, investments, deceptive mailings and other consumer frauds, especially when they target the elderly or other susceptible groups.

Money Laundering

Postal Inspectors aggressively investigate criminals who attempt to conceal the proceeds of illegal acts through monetary transactions. Inspectors identify and seize criminals' assets, denying violators the proceeds of their crimes.

Robberies

Postal Inspectors respond promptly to robberies of postal employees and postal contractors. Inspectors focus on preventing robberies through the use of security equipment and improved postal procedures.

Theft of Mail

Postal Inspectors invest significant resources into the investigation of mail theft by criminals.

Legislative Update

President Bush Signs into Law an Act that Implements 9/11 Recommendations

On August 3, 2007 President Bush signed the Implementing Recommendations of the 9/11 Commission Act of 2007 (HR 1) (the Act). The Act implements some of the recommendations of the 9/11 Commission including mandating 100% inspection of all air and sea cargo entering the United States as well as a new method of redistributing antiterrorism funding. "This legislation builds upon the considerable progress we have made in strengthening our defenses and protecting Americans since the attacks of Sept. 11," Bush said in a statement.

Among some of the Acts notable provisions is a requirement for screening of all cargo on passenger planes within three years and a five-year goal of scanning all container ships for nuclear devices before they leave foreign ports. It also elevates the importance of risk factors in determining which states and cities get federal security funds. That would mean more money for such cities as New York and Washington. It also puts money into a new program to ensure that security officials at every level can communicate with each other.

The independent 9/11 Commission in 2004 issued 41 recommendations covering domestic security, intelligence gathering and foreign policy. Congress and the White House followed through on some, including creating a director of national intelligence, tightening land border screening and cracking down on terrorist financing.

Democrats, after taking over control of Congress, promised to make completing the list a top priority.

The Act also:

- Authorizes more than \$4 billion for four years for rail, transit and bus security.
- Establishes a new electronic travel authorization system to improve security for visitors from countries participating in the visa waiver program. Bush said he would continue to work with Congress to provide more flexibility to bring some of the closest U.S. allies into the program.
- Strengthens a board that oversees privacy and civil liberties issues.
- Requires the president and Congress to disclose total spending requested and approved for the intelligence community.
- Provides civil immunity to those who, in good faith, report suspicious activities that threaten the safety and security of passengers on a transportation system or that could be an act of terrorism.

- Requires the President to confirm that Pakistan is making progress combating al-Qaeda and Taliban elements within its borders before the United States provides aid to the country

One other notable provision of the law establishes a voluntary certification program to assess whether private industry complies with voluntary preparedness standards. Title XI of the Act states: Private Sector Preparedness - (Sec. 1101) Amends HSA to direct the Secretary to: (1) develop and implement a program to



enhance private sector preparedness for acts of terrorism and other emergencies and disasters through the promotion of the use of voluntary consensus standards; (2) develop guidance and identify best practices to assist action by the private sector in identifying hazards, assessing risks and impacts, and developing mutual

aid agreements; and (3) support the development of, promulgate, and regularly update national voluntary consensus standards that will enable private sector organizations to achieve optimal levels of emergency preparedness as soon as practicable.

ASIS members should follow developments that come out of the aforementioned provision of the Act since it will help private industry be more prepared for business disruptions.

- Secure Travel and Counterterrorism Partnership Act of 2007

Hitman Scam

In May 2000, a joint task force was developed between the FBI and the National White Collar Crime Center. This collaboration is known as The Internet Crime Complaint Center. Since their inception, the Center has

received more than 1 million consumer complaints about alleged cyber fraud. One of the newest scams to be reported is known as the "Hitman" scam, which first appeared in December 2006.



The "Hitman" scam is much like other more widely known scams, in that it attempts to get its unsuspecting victim to give up monies. In previously reported scams, like the "Floating Fund Scam", victims were requested to avail their bank account information so as to allow the sender an opportunity to obtain a large inheritance (of which the recipient will get a large cut). In the end, bank accounts get emptied and no monies exchanged.

In the "Hitman" scam, the recipient is told that a hit has been placed on their life and in order to have it cancelled, they must front a large amount of money, usually between \$20,000 and \$100,000. Emails

have been received which state that the hitman has followed the recipient and has others doing the same. A threat is made that if the recipient reports the email to the authorities, they will be killed. Several of these emails have been received at the MGH and Spaulding Rehab. Again, this is a scam.

The Federal Bureau of Investigation (FBI) states that they have received no reports of money loss or threats carried out due to these emails.

"This is a hoax, so do yourself a favor and don't respond," says FBI special agent John Hambrick. "Replying to the emails just sends a signal to senders that they've reached a live account. It also escalates the intimidation," Hambrick said.

So, if you receive a "Hitman" scam email, please delete it and don't respond. (Quotations taken from Statistical information taken from <http://www.cnn.com>. www.fbi.gov.)

Greeting Card Scam

Reports continue to be received of Internet fraud related electronic greeting cards containing malware (malicious software). The cards, commonly referred to as e-cards or post-cards, are being sent via spam.

Similar to other Internet fraud schemes, the perpetrators claim the card is from a friend or family member. Generally the spam directs the recipient to click the link provided in the e-mail to view their e-card. (There can be slight variations in spam message.) Upon accessing the link the recipient is unknowingly taken to a harmful web page.

Always use caution regarding unsolicited emails. If you do not know the sender, the email could very well contain viruses or other malicious software.
