The 2008 Directory has an updated look and will be a valuable resource to all. We expect the Directory to be finalized and distributed over the next several weeks.

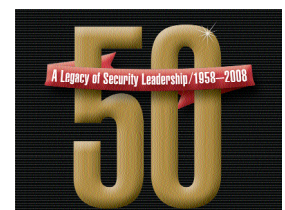
Don't forget to mark your calendars for the October 18th 50th Anniversary Gala. This affair promised to be like nothing we have experienced before.

Leadership Series David Spector, MIT Lincoln Laboratory

As part of the Boston Chapter's year-long 50th anniversary celebration, we are presenting interviews with some of the Chapter's leaders and founders in the next few newsletters.

Lyle W. Grindle, CPP, has been a member of the ASIS Boston Chapter since January 1, 1967. I spoke with Lyle recently about his experience as a security professional over the past 40+ years:

Q: What was your job prior to joining ASIS?

A: During the cold war I was in the military, conducting intelligence gathering on a submarine in the Pacific Ocean. Because of that experience I got hooked on security. I discovered I liked the profession, so I did some research and found ASIS (It was called the American Society for Industrial Security back then), and I joined.

When I left the military I was in the Boston area, and I found a job doing

undercover work. I would go to companies and find out who was committing theft, and I'd build a case to terminate them, put them in jail, or both.

I was also attending Northeastern University on the GI Bill. When I graduated I went to work for Arthur D. Little as a criminal justice consultant. I worked there for 10 years and my job was to travel across the globe and work with police departments, private companies and other organizations to set up their security program and management policies and procedures.

Q: What the Boston Chapter like when you joined?

A: It was a small group, but everyone I met was very interesting and dedicated to succeeding in the business. Larry Romano brought me into the chapter as a guest. I do remember that the Society was very heavily government oriented.

Once I became a member, I was very active and went to many local monthly meetings and national meetings. I was also active in the national and international side, and I became a member of the Cultural Property Protection Council. I also was a member of the International Association of Museum Security, and traveled to Warsaw to participate in a seminar with the group.

Q: What did you do after leaving AD Little?

A: I was the Director of Security for the Gardner Museum for 23 years, from 1981-2004. It was a great job and I really liked it. When the Gardner theft happened, it was sad but it was one of the most productive things that ever happened to museum security. People began to take security more seriously. Prior to the theft, training wasn't adequate, hiring practices weren't adequate; we didn't have the right equipment. But things changed

after the break-in. It really opened everyone's eyes. The one thing I still find strange, though, is that even now no one seems to share information with each other. Even between departments, groups don't talk to each other and it's worse with government and private companies.

Q: What do you remember the most about being a Boston Chapter member?

A: I always enjoyed the Law Enforcement Appreciation event. I always made it a point to take a law enforcement guest to the meeting, and it really opened their eyes as to what we were doing. It's really a valuable tool to create great relationships.

Q: What are you doing now?

A: I'm retired. My wife and I travel a lot, mostly to Europe and Hawaii. We also have a home in Maine and one in Massachusetts.

The Boston Chapter thanks you, Lyle, for your continued membership and dedication to the security profession.

Hurricane Preparedness Tom Smith, Comcast

The Hurricane Season in New England is defined as June 1st to November 30th, 75% of the over 40 tropical systems that have impacted our region in the past century have struck during the months of August and September. As we approach the Hurricane Season here is some facts and ideas to help you get your company prepared for the season.

Hurricane Prediction for 2008 - Researcher William Gray is predicting an above-average hurricane season in the Atlantic next year, with seven hurricanes-three of them major. Gray believes this year's forecast calls for a total of 13 named storms in the Atlantic. He states there is a slightly higher-than-average chance that at least one major hurricane will hit the United States.

Factoid: Last Category 3 Hurricane to impact New England was in 1938

The "Long Island Express" hit land on September, 21st of 1938. The hurricane made landfall over Long Island and Connecticut that afternoon as a Category 3 hurricane. The storm became extratropical after landfall and dissipated over south-eastern Canada on September 22.

Blue Hill Observatory, Massachusetts measured sustained winds of 121 mph with gusts to 183 mph (likely influenced by terrain). A U.S. Coast Guard station on Long Island measured a minimum pressure of 27.94 in. Storm surges of 10 to 12 ft inundated portions of the coast from Long Island and Connecticut eastward to southeastern Massachusetts, with the most notable surges in Narragansett Bay and Buzzards Bay. Heavy rains before and during the hurricane produced river flooding, most notably along the Connecticut River. This hurricane struck with little warning and was responsible for 600 deaths and \$308 million in damage in the United States.

Hurricane safety tips for business owners

- Test your plan, reviewing it annually. Establish an employee-training program on your hurricane plan.
- Make plans for protection of your computer files, including a back-up system to secure data and safe storage of the data.
- Protect corporate records, keeping duplicates at an alternate location.



- Well in advance, acquire emergency protective equipment and supplies. Heavy plastic sheeting, duct tape, sandbags, emergency generator, chain saw and large pieces of plywood will help protect your property.
- Bring in display racks and other objects, such as trashcans that might cause damage if airborne. Remove outdoor signs, especially those that swing or are portable.
- Move merchandise, equipment or furniture away from windows or skylights. Elevate boxes or equipment, if possible.
- Turn off electricity and disconnect all electrical appliances and equipment (except for refrigeration equipment), in case there is a power outage. An ensuing power surge could be damaging to equipment.
- Inform all employees on when and how you will notify them to report back to work.

- Develop an employee identification system, such as picture ID badges. This may help employees gain access to the area after a hurricane.
- If possible, make arrangements to pay employees in cash. It may be several days before banking institutions are operational.

Here are some examples of how to protect your property:

- Learn the particular hurricane risks for your area. Find out if your home is subject to storm surge or inland flooding.
 - Make a record of your personal property. Keep an itemized list of your furniture, clothing and valuables to assist adjusters in case of a claim. Back it up with photos or video.
 - Protect your insurance policies and other important documents in a secure place like a safe deposit box or a watertight box.
 - Keep trees and shrubbery trimmed. Remove diseased or damaged tree limbs that could be blown down during a storm.
 - Clear clogged rain gutters.

Hurricanes/tropical storms often bring heavy rain. Providing clear drainage will help prevent misdirected flooding.

- Make sure storage sheds or other out-buildings are securely anchored, either to a permanent foundation or with straps and ground anchors.
- Make temporary plywood covers to protect windows and sliding doors. Drill holes for screws or lag bolts in each cover and around each window. Use a numbering or lettering system that shows which cover goes with which window. Store the mounting screws or lag bolts with the covers in a place where they are readily accessible. Note: Taping of windows does not prevent them from breaking.
- Make a list of outdoor items to bring inside in case of a storm, such as lawn furniture, trash barrels, hanging plants, toys and awnings. A list will help you remember anything that can be broken or picked up by strong winds and used as a missile.

- Learn to shut off utilities, as well as where gas pilots and water mains are located.
- Close and lock doors and windows to ensure that they are closed tight to help protect against strong winds and rain.
- Buy Flood Insurance. Unlike damage from hurricane winds, water damage from coastal or inland flooding is not covered by homeowners insurance. Contact your local insurance agent or contact the National Flood Insurance Program (NFIP).



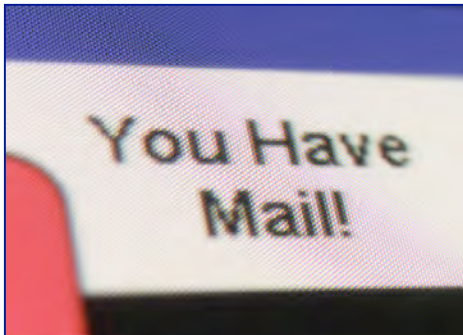
